The State of Racial Diversity in Romance Publishing Study tracks the publication of books written by authors who are BIPOC in the traditional romance publishing genre.

This year marks the fifth iteration of our annual Diversity Report. After five years of collecting data, we have an increasingly clear picture of who publishers are publishing each year. The numbers are frequently erratic; while we may see some improvements in one publisher's numbers from one year to the next, there is a lack of consistent, year-over-year improvement across the industry to diversify the authors they publish.

2020 brought a new round of statements from publishers affirming their commitment to anti-racism and dismantling white supremacist structures within publishing. But we continue to see and be troubled by the discrepancy between corporate statements and the number of authors of color who are published and therefore compensated by these companies.

We will continue to track the data and we hope the future brings marked improvement in racial diversity across romance publishing.


WHAT PERCENTAGE OF BOOKS PUBLISHED IN 2020 WERE WRITTEN BY BIPOC?
























For every 100 books published by the leading romance publishers in 2020, 12 were written by BIPOC.

(It is worth nothing that if one were to exclude the books published by Kensington from this calculation, the industry average would be 8.3%, which is the same as the total industry number in 2019.)

That compares to 8.3% in 2019, 7.7% in 2018, 6.2% in 2017 and 7.8% in 2016.
